**Essay 3:** Plan a week's unit to teach anti-bullying to your students. In your introduction, talk about the ideas you felt needed to be included. In the summary, be sure to include assessment of learning. Is a week's teaching enough? Will you need to revisit the unit? How will you do that?

**Essay 4:** Create your own demonstration of the learning you take from this text. Identify your topic and describe it in an introductory paragraph. You may choose from the list below or develop your own.
